The Cass Art Prize 2024 aims to champion contemporary art from across the UK & Ireland, with a £10,000 cash prize and a free stand at The Other Art Fair in spring 2025 awarded to the overall winner of the competition. There are additional prizes worth £5,000 including a Students Award, an Art Educators Award and more.

This exhibition at Copeland Gallery in London includes the Prize-Winning, Shortlisted and Longlisted works carefully selected by the prestigious judges; artists **Curtis Holder**, **Justin Mortimer** and **Sinta Tantra**, Independent Curator & Broadcaster **Kathleen Soriano**, gallery Founder & Owner **Pippy Houldsworth**, Co-Host of podcast Talk Art & Partner at Carl Freedman Gallery **Robert Diament**, and **Ryan Stanier** Founder of The Other Art Fair.

The Cass Group comprises Cass Art, the UK's leading art supplies retailer, and the SAA, the world's largest art membership programme, which exists to inform, encourage and inspire. The annual SAA Artists of the Year competition category-winning works are also on display, alongside a selection of works by Cass Group Staff artists.

CEO & Founder of The Cass Group

The Cass Art Prize continues my family legacy of supporting artists for more than 120 years. My great-great-uncles, Paul and Bruno Cass(irer) made their names in the late 1890s as Europe's preeminent art dealers, largely responsible for championing French impressionists such as Monet, Cezanne and Van Gogh.

My father, Wilfred Cass, later ran Reeves, the world's oldest paint manufacturer. In addition, he launched the Cass Sculpture Foundation, a British charity that commissioned more than 450 sculptures from emerging artists over 25 years and enabled the first three commissions on the Fourth Plinth in Trafalgar Square.

The Cass Art Prize is generously supported by my father's Estate, and its inaugural exhibition marks what would have been his 100th birthday.

2024 is also a very special year for us, as we celebrate 40 Years since I first started Cass Art, so it seems fitting to take this opportunity to bring together & celebrate just some of the amazing artistic talent we have across the UK & Ireland.

I would like to thank all our Artists, Judges & Partners for their support bringing this wonderful exhibition to life.

I hope you enjoy what we hope to be the first of many years of this special event, and hopefully you'll be inspired to take part in The Cass Art Prize in the future yourself!

Ruqaiya Asim

Communication with My Guide Dog, 2024

Newsprint & tissue paper ink monoprints, Brailled black card, clay & plaster, 220x110x30cm.

Ruqaiya Asim is a mixed-media artist studying her BA at The Slade School of Fine Art. Severely sight-impaired and a guide dog user, her work focuses on disability awareness.

This installation explores the communication between the artist and her guide dog, Bertie, emphasising their trust and bond. The monoprints trace the shape of Bertie's harness, whilst the Braille piece in the centre allows those who cannot read Braille to experience the inaccessibility of art for sight-impaired people.

Orlanda Broom

Moon's Grip, 2023

Acrylic on canvas, 110x110x2cm.

Orlanda Broom studied MA Fine Art at Winchester School of Art, Barcelona, and exhibits internationally. Her work has been selected for the Columbia Threadneedle Prize and the RA Summer Exhibition.

In this landscape filled with exotic foliage, Orlanda uses colour to evoke a sense of freedom and sensuality. The work explores the tension between themes of abandonment, life cycles, growth and decay.

Milton Keynes-based artist Clive studied at the Norfolk Painting School. A committee member of the Contemporary British Portrait Painters, he exhibits widely and has won numerous awards.

This painting portrays the artist's grandchildren. Zach had a rare condition that took his life aged just six. The work captures their sibling bond and expresses a joy beyond the tragedy of Zach's condition.

Oil on okawara paper, 110x190cm.

Morag Caister, winner of Sky Arts Portrait Artist of the Year 2022. explores existential themes through portraiture and the nude. Her work is featured in prestigious collections, including the National Portrait Gallery.

This work is part of the "Sofa Series" which focusses on portraits set in domestic spaces, with the sofa as a central element. It examines themes like relationships, consent and psychoanalysis.

Only Memories, 2024

Gouache on board, 40.5x51.5cm.

Jack Candy-Kemp studied for his MA in Painting at Wimbledon College of Arts. Inspired by travel and counterculture, he paints in gouache, exploring tourism's liminal spaces and challenging idealised travel imagery.

This painting draws inspiration from bus stops Jack saw when visiting Disneyland Paris. When travelling, the artist feels pressured to create lasting memories, struggling to live in the moment.

Jione Choi studied an MFA at the Slade School of Fine Art. She has won numerous awards, including the RWS Young Artist Award and Signature Art Prize and exhibited internationally in over 40 group shows.

In this work inspired by Jione's memories associated with jet lag from frequent travel between South Korea and the UK, the artist explores identity and feelings of dislocation.

Damien Cifelli is a self-taught artist from Edinburgh who explores a fictional world, "Tarogramma," in his work. He has exhibited internationally and won the Thyssen Versiona Award 2023.

In this work, Damien constructs a fictional scene that feels both alien and familiar. His painting of The Contra Forest portrays a new world where reality warps, offering refuge, mystery, and limitless possibilities.

Victoria Coombes, a Bristol-based artist at Spike Island studios, focuses on manipulating materials and surfaces. Her work leans towards evocation and apparition rather than traditional figurative or representational forms.

Familiar fleeting images or resonances are found in the stains, fragments and traces in the work. The viewer is encouraged to look beyond the immediate image into a subjective, suggestive realm of meaning.


Ellie Cottrell

Based in Cheltenham, Ellie recently returned to drawing, working primarily in oil pastel. Her current work explores human interaction, vulnerability and tension through figures and nature, often conveying unease.

Plants absorb the sun's energy, they photosynthesise. In this work, the figure is the sun, consumed, and fuelling their growth. Or perhaps she is drawing energy from the plants, harnessing their power to grow herself.

This work features acrylic on celluloid over an intricate watercolour background, a process inspired by traditional cel animation.

Angelina May Davis is a Birmingham-based painter. In 2021, she was selected for Bloomberg New Contemporaries after completing the Turps Banana Correspondence Course, exploring belonging through her work.

This work depicts an English village green, featuring a gargoyle and a bowed female figure. Inspired by family memories and images of 1970s village life, the work explores the theme of belonging.


KV Duong

KV is a Vietnamese artist with a transnational background, known for creating paintings on latex that explore identity, materiality, and ancestral history. He holds an MA in Painting from the Royal College of Art.

In this work, the door motif represents access and inaccessibility regarding colonial and LGBTQ+ histories. The left frame depicts a desolate cityscape, while the right portrays a family portrait.

Amy Dury is a Glasgow School of Art and University of Brighton alumna. She appeared on Sky Arts Portrait Artist of the Year in 2021 and exhibited in the Trinity Buoy Wharf Drawing Prize.

In this painting the relationship between owner and pet is explored - but who owns who? The artist emphasises the elevated status of some animals, while others remain in the background, overlooked.

Bella is a London-based artist, curator, and educator. She studied at the Royal Academy Schools and has work in prominent collections. Bella exhibits widely and currently has a solo exhibition 'Everything Flows' at Enia Gallery, Athens.

The "Guardian" series forms part of a new body of work exploring ideas around the conflict of opposites and veils of time. Using traditional methods in unconventional ways, the work evokes intrigue, subtlety, and nostalgia.

Naila's practice captures moments and emotions through sweeping brushstrokes. Influenced by personal losses, this work is part of her series "Embracing and Repelling" exploring the complexities of love and frustration in relationships.

Waste material and wire, 115x38x26cm.

Lizzie Hill, winner of the 2023 Royal Academy Jack Goldhill Prize for Sculpture, creates large forms from waste materials. Her work explores the human impact on the planet and has been widely exhibited.

In this work, Lizzie weaves waste materials into layers, creating an anthropomorphic form. The piece, inspired by geological strata, questions the value of man-made materials and highlights environmental fragility.

The artist's lifelong love for nature and wildlife revived after her mother's passing, leading her to rediscover drawing with coloured pencils, transitioning from hobbyist to professional while embracing the learning process.

This work is inspired by a photograph by Corrine Ammann. The artist felt compelled to draw the Chimpanzee, captivated by the connection and understanding reflected in its gaze, highlighting the intensity of its focus.

Giuseppe lozzi is a Brighton-based painter and secondary school art teacher. He studied his postgraduate degree at UAL and recently completed the Turps correspondence course while maintaining his artistic practice.

This painting explores time in his school, capturing empty spaces where students once were. His work features crumpled papers and scuffed surfaces, creating a reflective pause amid the school's relentless pace.

Soon Yul Kang studied fiber arts in South Korea and Japan, and received her MA at Goldsmiths College. Her works focus on meditation and healing, have been exhibited internationally, receiving numerous awards and honours.

In this work the Korean word for "Human Being" is written in calligraphy, and collaged to create a circular form, reflecting on the Zen understanding of simplicity, stillness, repetition, and rebirth.

Gabriella Kardos, born in Bucharest under Ceauşescu's regime, emigrated to Montreal after time in a Vienna refugee camp. Educated at Concordia University, she is a London-based painter and printmaker.

Inspired by a photograph, the painting reflects the artist at 16 in Vienna, awaiting asylum after fleeing Romania. It captures a lightness of being despite her uncertain future.

In this piece, the artist depicts the slow dissolution of civilisation into nature, envisioning modern life as a relic submerged beneath water, lost to the rivers of time.





Donna focuses on transforming a lethal subject into exquisite, pocket-sized paintings. As this project evolved, she realised the atomic bomb's shapes often mirror what it destroys, highlighting a poignant irony in today's world.

The artist was inspired by Ben Enwonwu's 1974 "Mona Lisa" depicting Nigerian princess Adetutu Ademiluyi. Reuben reimagines this portrait of Ada, a Jamaican Maroon, embodying resilience and Black joy. The work is dedicated to the artist's mother Catherine.





This painting explores the emotional journey of migration, blending nostalgia for home with the excitement of new beginnings, highlighting the universal experiences of longing, loss, and hope shared by migrants.

A studio potter and ceramic artist based in Pembrokeshire, Wales, Richard creates pieces inspired by the coastal landscape surrounding his home and studio. Self-taught, his work invites personal interpretation and is sold internationally.

This stoneware vase, part of the "Under The Sea" collection, highlights the impact of global warming and coastal erosion. Inspired by 17th-century Delft tulip vases, it features biophilic coastal designs.

Gigantic Pile (WYRM), 2022-2024

Paper-concrete (re-cycled newspaper pulp - Evening Standard, Metro) acrylic pigment, re-claimed corrugated metal, spray paint, timber, plywood, re-cycled underlay, 260x80x180cm.

Catriona is a 2019 Royal College of Art MA Sculpture graduate and has been a UAL technician for over 10 years. She received the Second Prize UK New Artist of the Year Award at the Saatchi Gallery, and the Gilbert Bayes Award.

Catriona's worm-like creatures digest synthetic materials, reshaping cities as future geological imprints in a post-human future. Her work examines the interplay between nature, architecture and deep time, imagining a re-wilding of the city.

Initially studying literature and working as a copywriter, Susan transitioned to visual expression with a narrative focus. She studied for her postgraduate degree at the Royal College of Art and now exhibits internationally.

This painting explores the emotions of winter's turning, celebrating nature's potential. It features both masculine and feminine elements, depicting playful animals and protective female forms amidst vibrant colours.

Erika is a Swedish sculptor based in London, exhibiting internationally. Her recent highlights include a show at Fold Gallery in 2023, exhibiting work at the Venice Biennale 2024, and receiving the 2023 Gilbert Bayes Award.

This piece is a staircase that does not connect, leading nowhere; a fragile, precarious construction, teetering on collapse. It uses the possibility of failure to gently question our relentless pursuit of progress.
